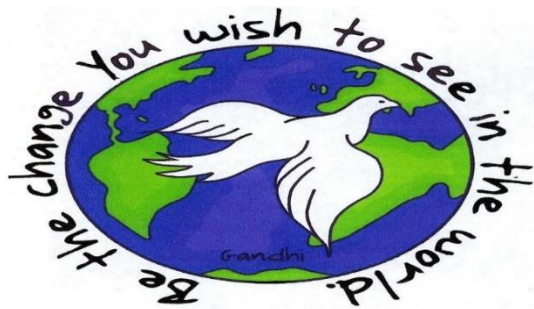

The official holiday is October 1, which commemorates the founding of the People's Republic of China 66 years ago. To celebrate, most of the country takes that week off work. Everyone also takes the opportunity to travel, spend time with family and shop.

Mid- Autumn Festival

Another holiday celebrated during this season is the Mid-Autumn Festival. The **Mid-Autumn Festival** (traditional Chinese: 中秋節; simplified Chinese: 中秋节; Vietnamese: *tết Trung Thu*) is a harvest festival celebrated by both ethnic Chinese and Vietnamese people. The festival is held every year on the 15th day of the 8th month of the lunar calendar with a full moon at night. This is usually during the period in late

September to early October of the Greco Roman calendar with a full moon at night. On this occasion, people eat moon cake (pictured above). Moon cake is a round shaped cake that is traditionally filled with lotus beans. Today, though it can be filled with other ingredients such as fruits or even ice cream. Other foods people enjoy during this holiday are Cassia wine and Vietnamese rice figures. The Cassia is a wine that is the traditional choice for "reunion wine" drunk in the moon festival. The rice figure known as *tò he* is a figure (shape or statue) made out of rice. One myth told during the festival is called the myth of Chang'e. The New Electives

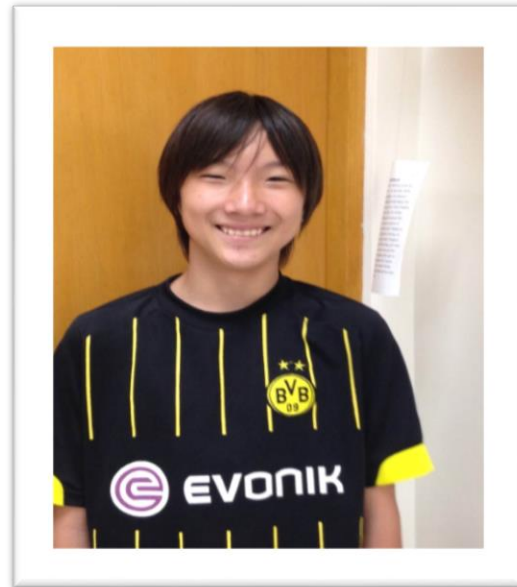

Outside of school, Soll mostly babysat, volunteered at a preschool, attended martial

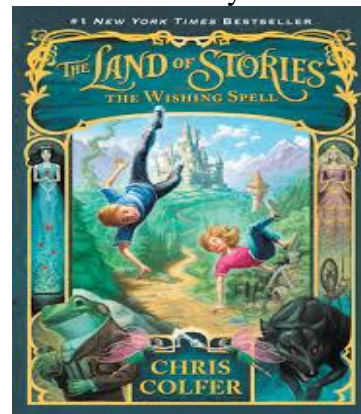
arts club for learning self-defense, and went to the gym as well.

In Case of Inclement Weather:

According to our Handbook, SIS will **remain open unless Typhoon condition one or two is declared**. These conditions are determined by the governor of the CNMI and the National Weather Service. When the island is in **Tropical Storm** condition one or two, we will stay open based on whether there is running water and electricity, as well as, whether it's safe for our students.

The school answering machine (288-9660) will always have an updated announcement informing you whether the school is open or closed.



Very Important: Parents should park in the parking lot if they want to walk their children to the classrooms. Please **DO NOT** leave your cars parked in the driveway because it stops the flow of traffic.

If you would like to enter any of the school buildings, please park in the parking lot or in the field. For safety purposes, do not park on the road. Please try to pick up your children by 2:45 p.m., unless other arrangements have been made.

Please keep in mind:

- *Classes start at 7:45 a.m. Attendance is taken at the beginning of the day. If your child will be absent, please contact the school office.*
- *School ends at 2:45 p.m. Please do not enter the classroom to retrieve your child before 2:45pm. This may disrupt the teachers' dismissal process.*

- *If you want to celebrate your Elementary school aged child's birthday during the school day, please contact your child's teacher in advance. Otherwise, you may bring food (pizza, cake, etc) to the class during lunch time at the pala pala. No celebrations are to be held inside the classrooms. No gifts, please!*
- *All students should bring a bottle of water. They can refill the bottle at school, but it is necessary for them to have the container. We are trying to*

help our island by putting less paper in the landfill.
